# UN DRUG CONTROL CONVENTIONS CHECKLIST MAIN MANDATORY REQUIREMENTS ON PARTIES

## INSTITUTIONAL INFRASTRUCTURE FOR DOMESTIC AND INTERNATIONAL DRUG CONTROL

- T Establish and maintain a special licit drug regulatory administration: (1961 C=n, A 17; 1971 C=n, A 6)
- T Establish and maintain central offices for international cooperation:
  - S precursor control (1988 C=n, A 12)
  - S mutual legal assistance (1988 C=n, A 7)
  - S maritime cooperation (1988 C=n, A 1,)

### REGULATION OF TRADE IN CONTROLLED DRUGS FOR LICIT USE AND IN CONTROLLED CHEMICALS

- T Classify each controlled drug and chemical under domestic law to ensure the minimum required Convention controls apply: (1961 C=1, A 2, 4; 1971 C=1, A 2; 1988 C=1, A 12)
- T Limit the licit use of drugs to medical and scientific purposes (1961 C=n, A 2, 4; 1971 C=n, A 5, 7)
- T Prohibit opium, coca and cannabis cultivation, where A...prevailing conditions in the country..render..prohibition...the most suitable measure, in its opinion, for protecting..public health and welfare and preventing..diversion.@(1961 C=n, A 22)
- T End traditional coca leaf chewing, quasi-medical opium use and non-medical cannabis use by 13.12.89 (1961 Can, A 49)
- T Establish and maintain a national (registration), licencing and permit systems of controlled drugs and chemicals:
  - S cultivation (1961 C=n, A 4, 22, 23, 25, 26, 27 and 28)
  - S manufacture/distribution (1961 C=n, A 4, 21, 21 bis, 24, 25, 27, 29, 30; 1971 C=n, A 2, 3, 7, 8; 1988 C=n, A 12)
  - S import and export (1961 C=n, A 4, 21, 23, 24, 25, 31, 32; 1971 C=n, A 2, 3, 4, 7, 8, 12, 13, 14; 1988 C=n, A 12)
  - S supply by health care professionals (1961 C=n, A 2, 4, 30, 32, 33; 1971 C=n, A 2, 3, 4, 5, 9, 10, 14, 20)
- Establish and maintain forward estimates and *ex-post* statistics of domestic licit drug demand, communicate them to the INCB (with an annual report), and base domestic regulatory action on them to prevent divertable excess stocks (1961 C=n, A 2, 4, 9, 12, 13, 14, 19, 20, 21, 21 bis, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 34; 1971 C=n, A 2, 3, 16)
- Establish and maintain the compliance inspection of regulated persons and enterprises (1961 C=n, A 23, 29, 30, 31, 34; 1971 C=n, A 4, 7, 8, 15; 1988 C=n, A 12)

#### DEMAND REDUCTION

T Prevent drug abuse; make treatment/rehabilitation measures available (1961 C=n, A 38; 1971 C=n, A 20; 1988 C=n, A 14)

## DRUG-RELATED CRIMINAL JUSTICE

- Establish and adequately punish drug trafficking and related conduct (ff money laundering, precursor trafficking) as serious crimes, coordinate law enforcement action, and cooperate in law enforcement training, intelligence exchange and operations (1971 C=n, A 35, 36, 37; 1971 C=n, A 21, 22; 1988 C=n, A 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19)
- Establish measures to enable the tracing, freezing, seizing and ultimate confiscation of the proceeds of drug-related crime, notwithstanding bank secrecy laws (1988 Can, A 3, 5)
- Establish possession, purchase or cultivation of drugs for illicit personal consumption as a criminal offence, for which treatment, rehabilitation may be provided as alternatives to conviction and punishment or in addition (also for trafficking offence, An appropriate cases of a minor nature): (1961 C=n, A 2, 4, 36; 1971 C=n, A 3, 5, 22; 1988 C=n, A 3)

## INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE SECTOR COOPERATION

- T Provide international legal cooperation to other Parties in their serious drug-related casework:
  - s extradition (also to try to expedite and simplify extradition (1961 C=n, A 36; 1971 C=n, A 22; 1988 C=n, A 6)
  - S mutual legal assistance (including tracing, freezing, seizing and confiscating drug crime profits (1988 C=n, A 7)
  - S controlled delivery (1988 C=n, A 11)

- law enforcement cooperation (1988 C=n, A 9)
- \$ \$ \$ maritime cooperation against trafficking on the high seas (1988 C=n: A 17) use of the mails (1988 C=n: A 17)
